The Government is of course banning that as well. Citing it is noise pollution and they do not have police's approval. So how I understand it is that if they get the police's okay then it is not noise pollution or illegal. I do not know how they are going to control this type of protest. It is very interesting every single day here in Uganda.

Work is getting every interesting as well. We just finished training a class where we had 10 people registered for the class but only 4 showed up. So we had a board meeting to decide what we are going to do. It was decided was that we will discontinue training non-disabled people, and instead will to get funding by consulting for other NGO's with there projects and they pay us and that money we are using for training the disabled. So right now I am finalizing a project that adds a new computer lab and computers throughout the NGO also they will have solar computer in

their clinic, school, and administration. I am working on 2 other projects that will bring a software to a school textbook company. It will be used for a teaching aid and for individual to use at home. The other project is that I am remodeling a whole school. At this school there is no floors, doors, windows, desks, power, water or toilets. We were asked to bring the school up to standards. The person hired to do it the 1st time took the money and built a new house for his family instead of building the school. We think he took picture's of a different school and told the funders that this was there school they built. That is very common here in Uganda

Malaria

This month I was not very lucky when it came to my health. I was sick with Malaria again. This time I got it bad my doctor classified it as severe Malaria. I was sick for about 4 days and was not getting any better so my doctor took me from out patient and into inpatient. I was admitted for only one night but that day I received 2 injections of pain killers, 2 injection to stop the vomiting, 3 finger pricks for test, and 1 injection of anti-malaria 8 anti-malaria pills and 11 IV's. So as you can tell I was very sick and very dehydrated.

Adoption

As you already know I have been working on finishing the adoption early so I can start the next chapter of my missionary work. During this month I have been blessed by God and got a court date by a judge that would fit me into his very busy schedule. It was a little funny though because he granted me a court date of June 2nd and then about 4 days later the register called my lawyer and told him that I will not be seen on the 2nd of June due to his very busy schedule

so the register granted me a new court date of May 31st. So when the 31st came it was postponed until June 2nd So now the 2nd my case will be heard and about a week later I will be given a answer yes the adoption is finished or no I will have to stay and complete the adoption. What that means is that I will have to stay in Uganda until the about Christmas time.

On the American side of the adoption, I was denied approval by the American gov-

ernment. So right now my Immigration lawyer is trying to figure out on what grounds I was denied. What they told me was that I do not make enough money and I did not talk face to face to the probation officer in Minnesota. We are trying to figure out why they want me to fly back to Minnesota to meet with her and that I need less money to live in Uganda than I do in the USA. So right now I am trying to get all the facts. So when I get that I will inform you all.

With all the road blocks that I am running into right now I am reminded of this passage!!!
